## The Importance of Attendance: Learning is Cumulative <br> H Green



Value education and give it high priority in your family! Convey a positive attitude about school and treat going to school as part of the normal course of events, something that is expected of your child. Let him/her know that school is the most important thing in his/her life at this time, and that his/her future job opportunities will depend on how well (s)he handles his/her present "job" (school). Help him/her develop good study and work habits and praise him/her when (s)he is successful. Get to know your child's friends as they have more influence with him/her at this time in his/her life than you do. Get personally involved in school activities, go to sporting events, attend plays and concerts, join the Parent Group/Advisory Board, volunteer, read the school paper. Know what's going on at school [McKenny Independent School District]

Students usually begin each new school year with excitement and enthusiasm - even if they don't show it to adults. The anticipation of new classes, new friendships, and renewing old friendships provides real motivation for daily attendance at school during those first few weeks. Unfortunately, after a brief time some students, particularly those at the middle and high school levels and those who don't do well in school, become careless about regular attendance. Missing a few classes seems inconsequential to them. Sometimes it seems insignificant to parents as well.

The teaching/learning process builds upon itself: Each lesson presented to students is based upon or related to those that preceded it. Just as we can never regain a
moment of time wasted, the child who misses a day of school also misses a day of education which cannot be retrieved. Indeed, research shows that those children who attend school regularly are more likely to be successful during their school years.

Success after graduation is a second reason for regular school attendance. If young people don't develop the habits of good attendance and prompt completion of assignments while they're in school, when will they learn these things? Their success as adults in their chosen occupations is dependent upon these habits. From experience, most teachers know that students' success in their school years is directly related to the importance that parents attach to education. If parents believe and act as if the child's education is important, the child will most likely believe it too. So it
is with regular attendance at school. When parents believe that consistent attendance is important and communicate that belief to their children starting in the elementary years, unnecessary absences from school will be dramatically reduced [Polson k12 District 23].

What can Parents do?

1. Let your child know that you expect him/her to attend school every day. Explain that, just as you have a job, it's his/her job to go to school and learn.
2. Set a time for doing homework each evening and a time for going to bed. Unfinished homework and too little sleep are common reasons why parents hear the words, "I don't feel good," on school mornings.
3. Get involved with your child's school. When (s)he sees you in the halls or the classrooms (s) he'll understand that school is important.

## The Importance of Attendance (Continued)

Attendance patterns are formed early in life. Children who develop good attendance habits in the early grades will be more likely to continue them throughout their school career. That's important, because students who miss school miss out on carefully planned sequences of instruction. They miss out on active learning experiences and class participation. They miss out on the opportunity to ask questions. They are more likely to fall behind. And they are more likely to drop out [Copyright © 2003 The Parent Institute].

I know that it is getting warm and we have more light and the temptation to go outside is all to real. However, please continue to urge your child to go to school and resist the temptation to skip classes.

# ASD Climate and Connectedness Parent/Guardian Survey 

Parents of Students in grades K - $\mathbf{1 2}$

The 2010 Climate and Connectedness Parent/ Guardian Survey is being administered to provide schools with information about perceptions and experiences related to school climate and connectedness for use in setting school goals and redirecting resources. This is an annual survey implemented and analyzed jointly by the ASD departments of Safe and Drug Free Schools and Assessment and Evaluation. The survey will take place between March 22 and June 30 of 2010.

Parents/Guardians should complete one survey for each child in school. There are many different ways to access the survey:

- Mailing of paper surveys-Surveys will be mailed with students' SBA and HSGQE test results during the first week of June. There will be a separate mailing for parents/ guardians of juniors and seniors not taking the HSGQE retest and parents/guardians of kindergarten, grade 1 and 2 students. All of the surveys will be in self-addressed, postagepaid mailers, making it easy for parents/ guardians to return the surveys directly back to the Assessment and Evaluation

## What to Do About Senioritis...Make Your Senior Year Count

Seniors, you have worked hard for three plus years, taking tests, completing projects, and preparing for what comes next... after high school. When senior year rolls around, some students are tempted to take it easy the last few months and school becomes more of a place to socialize than take seriously.

Students can mistakenly believe they can put less than $100 \%$ into high school their senior year. The truth is your senior year, the entire senior year, is actually more important than they realize and is actually of particular interest to colleges and potential employers.

Usually referred to as senioritis, taking it easy senior year may seem like a nice break, but is likely to do more harm than good. It's not a new thing, it's been around long before I, and your parents, went to high school. I remember making so many trips to the beach the last quarter of high school I probably could have made it there with my eyes closed.

Senioritis can jeopardize your chances for success after high school. Because it will more than likely affect your grades, your attendance, possibly your references ... and college admissions officers, potential employers, the military, etc are able to look at this when you turn in your application...there's a really good chance any "relaxed" performance your senior year can make a difference in their decision

In order to make a point let's look at the senior with applying to college:
Many college applications (including the Common Application) require you to list your senior courses, including information about course levels and credit hours. It will be very obvious to the admissions officers if you've decided to "take the year off."

Many colleges also include as part of the application a form called the mid-year grade report. Your counselor completes this form with first-half grades and sends it to the colleges to which you've applied. It then becomes a crucial part of the application folder.

When you are accepted college acceptance letters include warnings to students such as "Your admission is contingent on your continued successful performance." This means colleges reserve the right to deny you admission should your senior year grades drop.
It is not at all rare for a college to withdraw an offer of admission when grades drop significantly over the course of the senior year.

Colleges are also going to want to know you have continued your involvement in activities, sports, and volunteer work. For example, did you remain committed to the internship or career-focused job opportunity you were in at the beginning your senior year. Colleges know these meaningful and significant experiences not only help you to make informed decisions about your education they will be important in your ability to have career goals and remain focused on a plan to achieve them.

Keep in mind that your senior year is your opportunity to strengthen your skills and broaden your experiences, in school and out, to prepare for all of the challenges ahead. A successful senior year can help launch you on the path to a successful future.

Spring Mountain Intensive

## Grades 7-12

If the idea of having a springtime relationship with nature is your idea of fun, then the Spring Mountain Intensive is for you. This class will deal with the basics of backpacking and wilderness travel. We'll spend the first two days discussing appropriate gear, food, first aid, and map reading. Students MUST have appropriate gear for this class, especially footwear. Well fitting boots are a must and should be purchased prior to the class in time to be broken in for the trips. Not doing so is likely to result in painful blisters. Students are required to provide their own gear and food. Much of the gear may be borrowed or rented from REI or AMH. Food may be purchased almost anywhere, but weight concerns will guide your decisions.

Beyond the gear issues, with some luck, we'll have good weather for our multi-day trips up Eagle River Valley and the second trip as the weather allows. As always, what we are able to do will be determined by the weather. This intensive is early enough that it may limit our trail options because of snow cover at lower elevations. Nights are also likely to be cool with temperatures that may drop below freezing, so you will need a sleeping bag rated to +20 degrees Fahrenheit or warmer and a sleeping pad (no air mattress).

Other than gear, you will need to be in good hiking condition; so walking some distance ( 1 to 2 miles daily) in the weeks leading up to the intensive would be a good idea.

It is not likely that we'll see any wildlife close up, because of the size of our group, but having a pair of binoculars is always handy for viewing things at a distance.

Beyond this, the wilds of Alaska always provide some of the most spectacular viewing in the world and should provide us with plenty of breathtaking moments that you will be able to capture on camera, should you choose to bring one.

One final note; we will need at least one chaperone on each of the trips and will need more than one to help with the driving to and from trail heads, so if your parents can help with either the driving, chaperoning, or both please have them contact Jen at Steller. The following is the itinerary for the intensive.

May 3-4 Classroom and Day hikes
May 5-7 Backpack the Eagle River Valley Trail (20 miles round trip)
May 8-9 Weekend off
May 10 Debrief last trip and plan for the next one
May 11-14 TBA, but could be Caines Head, Eklutna Lake/Glacier, etc.

## Poll Shows Alaskans Support Keeping Exit Exam by 3-1 Margin

JUNEAU - A recent Dittman public opinion poll commissioned by Sen. Con Bunde, R-Anchorage, shows that 74 percent of Alaskans support keeping the High School Graduation Qualifying Exam, also known as the exit exam. Currently there is a bill in the Legislature that would repeal the exit exam.

Bunde, who authored the original exit exam language when it was passed into law in 1997, said the Dittman poll results clearly indicate that the public still supports the exam as a way to ensure that possessing a high school diploma means graduates can demonstrate basic competency in reading, writing and arithmetic.
"Currently in the Senate, there is, in my view, a misguided effort to do away with the high school graduation qualifying exam. This poll shows that three-quarters of the people of Alaska do not want it to go away," Bunde said. "That's a pretty substantial level of support."

Bunde said the idea to do away with the test is rooted in a well-intended push by some groups representing students who have had a difficult time passing the exam.
"Last year there were 8,008 graduates who passed the exit exam and received a high school diploma. At the same time there were 270 high school seniors who were unable to pass the exit exam, and therefore received a certificate of attendance," Bunde said. "So, the question is, should we dilute the value of the diploma for the thousands who passed it just to accommodate the few who do not? I don't think we should, and clearly, almost three-quarters of the Alaska public don't think we should, either."

The Dittman poll was conducted February 9-22, 2010. The bill to repeal the exit exam, SB 109, recently passed out of the Senate Education and the Community and Regional Affairs committees and is currently sitting in the Senate Finance Committee.

## Haiti Fundraiser Report



This year, Steller Secondary School partnered with The American Red Cross of Alaska - Haiti Earthquake Relief to raise money to help support those impacted by the earthquakes that devastated Haiti on January 12, 2010. The American Red Cross is working with its partners in the global Red Cross and Red Crescent network, including the Haitian Red Cross, and other partners to assist those affected by this disaster.

We asked students and their families to empty their coin jar, search couch cushions, check old pockets, and empty car coin stashes all in an attempt to put that spare change to good use.

Steller students got to work bringing in spare change, selling paper red cross logos to hang on the wall, and popcorn during lunch. The paper red cross logos slowly took over an entire wall. Everyone seemed to
enjoy seeing which advisory group had the most logos. Each day, a "Red Cross/Haiti Update" was written on our announcement board and included an interesting fact about coins and a fact about Haiti or the Red Cross. Students voted each week on which teacher they wanted to see get duct taped to the wall in our "stuck for a buck" fundraiser held during lunch on each Friday of our two-week coin drive. Students, staff, and even parents then bought strips of duct tape to stick a Steller teacher to the wall.
