Witness for the Prosecution by Agatha Christie: October 1 - 24, 2010

Only Agatha Christie could have conceived of such a convincing thriller. Leonard Vole is an unemployed inventor, his latest contraption being a new-fangled egg beater. When he is arrested for the sensational murder of a rich widow, the famous Sir Wilfrid Robarts agrees to appear on his behalf. Vole's only alibi witness is his wife, the calm and coldly calculating Christine Vole. Sir Wilfrid's task becomes even more impossible when Christine agrees to be a witness not for the defense but for the prosecution.

XA Christmas Story by Jean Shepherd: November 26 - December 19, 2010

Humorist Jean Shepherd's memoir of growing up follows 9-year-old Ralphie Parker in his quest to get a genuine Red Ryder BB gun under the tree for Christmas. Ralphie pleads his case before his mother, his teacher and even Santa Claus himself, at Goldblatt's Department Store. The consistent response: "You'll shoot your eye out." *A Christmas Story* has become a theatrical holiday classic.

Little Women by Louisa May Alcott January 28 - February 20, 2011

Louisa May Alcott wrote Little Women in 1867 based on her own childhood and that of her three sisters. Little Women has charmed and empowered children and adults around the world, inspiring the careers of J.K. Rowling among many others. Women such as Supreme Court Justices Sandra Day O'Connor and Ruth Bader Ginsberg, Secretary of State Hillary Clinton, and former First Lady and librarian Laura Bush cite Little Women as the most influential book of their childhoods. Anchorage playwright Shane Mitchell is authoring the adaption of the novel that ACT will present.

Lend Me a Tenor by Ken Ludwig March 11 - April 3, 2011

Winner of 3 Tony Awards and 4 Drama Desk Awards. Tito Morelli, the greatest tenor of his generation, is to appear for one night only as Otello. The star arrives late and, through a hilarious series of mishaps, is given a double dose of tranquilizers, passes out and is believed to have died. In a frantic attempt to salvage the evening, the producer's assistant is persuaded to get into Morelli's Otello costume and fool the audience. He succeeds admirably, but Morelli comes to and gets into his other costume ready to perform. Now two Otellos are running around in costume and two women are running around in lingerie. A sensation on Broadway and in London's West End, this madcap, screwball comedy is guaranteed to leave audiences teary-eyed with laughter.
