April is Autism Awareness Month



April 2 is recognized as 'World Autism Day' as established by the United Nations in 2007

Autism Spectrum Disorder is the fastest growing disability category. The incidence of autism is increasing at epidemic proportions according to the CDC-Center for Disease Control. It is estimated that 1 child in every 110 children will be diagnosed with autism spectrum disorder. With such a significant increase, it is vital that we increase awareness and information about this interesting and challenging disorder.

The 'puzzle' piece is the universal symbol for autism. Its pattern represents the complexity of autism; the different shapes represent the diversity of people who are affected; and the bright colors signify hope that increased awareness and early intervention can lead to better outcomes.

In an effort to promote Autism Awareness, many activities will occur across the Alaska and the nation during April-Autism Awareness month.


